## Working Together to Protect Our Water... and to Manage Invasive Species

A great regional resource you may never have heard of!
The Western New York Partnership for Regional Invasive Species
Management (WNYPRISM):

- Coordinates with its partners to protect our natural resources
- Provides priority levels and how to remove invasive species
  - Aquatic Eurasian watermilfoil and Curly leaf pondweed are in the lowest priority category because they cannot be eradicated
- Recommends that invasive species removal should also protect high priority resources like rare species or recreation assets

A great local resource you probably <u>have</u> heard of! The Audubon Community Nature Center (ACNC):

- Provides education and programs about invasive species
- Collaborates with WNYPRISM and Chautauqua Watershed
   Conservancy to monitor and remove water chestnut in our watershed.
- Provides hands-on volunteer opportunities for monitoring and removal
- Eradication of water chestnut IS possible because it has been discovered early and many volunteers are removing it properly.



## Proud partners of WNYPRISM and Audubon:

Chautauqua-Conewango Consortium, A Waterkeeper Alliance Affiliate, Chautauqua Lake Association (CLA), Chautauqua Watershed Conservancy (CWC), Conewango Creek Watershed Association (CCWA)

Eradication of the two aquatic invasive species, Eurasian milfoil and curly leaf pondweed in Chautauqua Lake, IS NOT feasible.

 They are too well established, they are vital to the fishery, and they help reduce harmful algal blooms

Ask our local officials to stop spending tax and local foundation dollars on herbicides that are NOT protecting our rare species or improving our recreation assets.
